Career Development

Federal Employment

Friday, Dec. 1, 9 a.m. - Noon

The Federal Government has excellent career opportunities in a variety of occupations. However, the Federal Employment Hiring process is complex and challenging! This process can be a confusing experience. This workshop will provide an overview of the hiring process. You will learn how to navigate the USAJOBS system, analyze a vacancy announcement, type of hiring programs and preferences and write a federal resume. Job Search Strategies

Tuesday, Dec. 5, 9 a.m. - Noon

Confused about how to look for a job? Wondering where the best jobs can be found? This workshop will enable you to develop a plan for your individual job search. Participants will learn the primary methods used by job seekers and customize a plan to fit their needs.

Resume Writing

Tuesday, Dec. 12, 9 a.m. - Noon

Do you wonder how to write your resume? Is your resume not getting the results you want? Our resume writing workshop will help you get started or show you how to improve your current resume. The class will discuss how to target your resume, select the best format for your work experience and create a cover letter. Don't pay someone else to write your resume!

Transition Assistance

Transition - Goals, Plans, Success (GPS)

Monday-Friday, Dec. 4-8, 8 a.m. - 4 p.m.

This five-day career and job search workshop is for separating service members seeking civilian employment. Topics include Tools for Transition, Military Occupational Cross Walk, skills assessment, resume writing, job search methods, interview techniques and a review of veteran's benefits and entitlements. Register now if you are within one year of separation or two years of retirement.

You must see your Command Career Counselor, obtain a signed DD Form 2648 –Pre-separation Counseling Checklist and a copy of your Individual Transition Plan before the workshop. Failure to do so may result in you being disenrolled from the class.

Transition GPS Capstone

By appointment only — Tuesdays, Dec. 5, 12 and 19

Capstone is a mandatory component of Transition GPS that must be completed no later than 90 days before your separation date. Capstone is scheduled by appointment only.

The following are required Capstone documents:

- Standardized ITP to include appropriate Career Track sections
- eBenefits registrations
- · Gap analysis
- Resume/employment application

- TGPS workshops certificates
- Licensure, certification and apprenticeship documents, if applicable
- 12-month post-military budget
- DD2958 Career Readiness Standards/ITP checklist
- DoD ID card/CAC Card

Executive Transition Goals, Plans, Success (GPS)

Monday-Friday, Dec. 11-15, 8 a.m. - 4 p.m.

Transition GPS course designated for E-9s and O-5s and above. This workshop is designed to prepare retiring service members for transition to civilian life. The program provides a comprehensive mix of education and skill building to meet Career Readiness Standards.

Topics include, but are not limited to:

- · Skills assessment
- Resume writing
- Interview techniques
- · Job search methods/salary negotiations
- · Review of Veteran entitlements
- Financial planning

In accordance with OPNAV 1900.2B, all participants are required to provide a completed and signed DD Form 2648–Preseparation Counseling Checklist. If you are within two years of retirement, please register the workshop.

Command Indoctrination/Newcomers' Orientation

Wednesday-Friday, Dec. 13-15, 8 a.m. - 4 p.m. Wednesday, Navy Pride and Professionalism Thursday and Friday, Command Indoctrination

Command Indoctrination facilitates the adaptation of Sailors and their families into their new working and living environments. The three-day information-packed Indoctrination is for all active-duty service members reporting to the U.S. Naval Academy, NSA Annapolis, Navy Band and Naval Health Clinic. Day One topic is Navy Pride and Professionalism. Day Two and Three topics are designed to make your move to a new community a smooth one. A highlight of the orientation is a tour of the Naval Academy! Spouses are encouraged to attend the Naval Academy tour. To register, contact your command representative training officer.

Hearts Apart: Deployment Discussion Group *Wednesday, Dec. 20, 6 - 7:15 p.m.*

Is your loved one deployed? A deployment discussion group is held on the first and third Tuesdays of each month at the Fleet and Family Support Center. Onsite child care is available at no charge with advanced request.

Home Team: Youth Deployment Support Group *Wednesday, Dec. 20, 6 - 7:15 p.m.*

The support group is for kids ages 5-18 who are experiencing a family deployment. Come join the Home Team to get involved, stay connected, have social support and learn about the "power of positive"!





Financial Management

Credit Management

Tuesday, Dec. 5, 12:30 - 1:30 p.m.

This single-session workshop provides valuable information on establishing a credit history, choosing and using credit and debit cards, debt-to-income ratio, consumer installment loans, credit reports and effectively managing your credit.

Blended Retirement System

Tuesday, Dec. 12, 3 - 4 p.m.

Learn about the new retirement system that is available to activeduty military members with less than 12 years of service as of Dec. 31, 2017. This class provides resources to assist in your decision making and a discussion of the Thrift Savings Plan, which is part of the Blended Retirement System. This program may be brought to area commands/work centers upon request.

Survivor Benefit Plan

Monday, Dec. 18, Noon - 1 p.m.

One of the most important aspects of financial planning is the ability to provide for survivor(s) in the event of a wage earner's death. This class explains how the Survivor Benefit Plan works, costs and coverage amounts, election options (who you can designate to receive the benefit) and other considerations to help you decide whether or not to elect this plan upon retirement.

Life Skills

Boot Camp for Babies

Thursday, Dec. 7, 11:30 a.m. - 3:45 p.m.

The workshop provides expectant parents and those with infants an understanding of an infant's world and some basic skills necessary for parenting. This class will address the challenges of parenting such as balancing work and family, safety issues, required health care paperwork and the hidden costs associated with a growing family. Participants will learn how to prepare financially for the newest member of the family.

Attending this workshop qualifies you, regardless of rank, for a Baby's First Sea Bag. The layette consists of a coordinated set of bedding and clothing and a handmade item (a knitted or crocheted sweater set and afghan) worth approximately \$100. Don't miss out on this exciting class that will help prepare you for parenthood.
